

DOMAINE DES PIERRES SÉCHESSaint-Joseph Rouge '1930' 2021

After wine studies in Beaune, winemaker Sylvain Gauthier decided to explore native Rhône grapes first with Michel Chapoutier and then with Stéphane Robert, before he was ready to start his own project in the true center of the Saint-Joseph appellation. He founded his micro-domaine in the village of Cheminas in 2007, the name "pierres séches" inspired by the hand-built, ancient stone walls that support vineyard terraces on the steep slopes of the northern Rhône. Farming organically and using little sulfites at bottling, Sylvain's wines are vibrantly flavored and energetically spiced—in sum, serious northern wines that have quickly become a musthave from an up-and-coming talent.

VINEYARDS: The lieu-dit 'Aubert' is in Saint-Jean de Muzols, one of the original three communes selected for the Saint-Joseph appellation in 1956. Vines face southeast, on decomposed granite and grainy, schist-rich soils. For decades, 'Aubert' was worked by Raymond Trollat, one of the pioneers of traditional Saint-Joseph wines; 'Aubert' has been planted to vines since World War I. Winemaker Sylvain Gauthier has but a few rows in 'Aubert,' which were planted in 1930, which inspired the wine's name.

AGE OF VINES: 90 years, on average

WINEMAKING: Hand-harvested. Full-cluster fermentation in temperature-controlled, stainless steel tanks on indigenous yeasts. Aged for 24 months in new and older French oak tonneaux (500L). Bottled unfined, with minimal added sulfites. Less than 1,000 bottles made each vintage.

TASTING IMPRESSIONS: Aromas of black fruit, black pepper, smoke, tobacco, licorice. Full-bodied and finely textured, with ripe, structured tannins and a long finish. Spiced plums, black cherry, great balance

PAIRING SUGGESTIONS: Pork terrine; grilled sausages with herbs; roasted chicken
